PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



The Pharmacy Council of New South Wales farewelled two of our original members who transitioned from the Pharmacy Board of NSW – our inaugural President Helen Dowling and our inaugural legal member Zoe Bojanac.

Both Helen and Zoe had finished their eligible terms and so bade farewell on 30 June 2015. We also welcomed Joyce Cooper and Penny Ho as our new Council members. Joyce and Penny commenced their terms on 1 July 2015, for a period of 3 years.

One priority from the 2014 strategic plan was to employ a Professional Officer, whose main roles would be to assist the Notifications and the Communications Committees, in managing complaints and in broadening and targeting our communications strategy, as part of the overall HPCA Communications Strategy. Katharina Nicholson commenced in this role early in 2015. This has given Council the ability to manage complaints in a more timely and efficient manner, and has contributed to the development of the Council newsletter and to formalising other avenues of communication with our stakeholders.

Through our Education and Research funding, the Council has provided grants to researchers in areas relevant to our legislative role. For example, in September 2015 a funding agreement was signed for research into, and the development of educational tools for, the teaching of ethics in tertiary institutions. Council will also be exploring the avenue of commissioned research in future years.

Council acknowledges the dedication of our staff. It is incredibly grateful for their commitment and enthusiasm in progressing changes in structure and procedures which have led to, and which will continue to lead to, overall improvements in the way in which Council conducts its legislated role.





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REGULATION OF PHARMACISTS IN NSW IN 2014/15 YEAR IN SUMMARY





Regulation of Pharmacists in NSW in 2014/15

Year in summary

NSW has 8,969 registered pharmacists which is 2.3% more than the 8,769 pharmacists registered last year and 30.9% of the 29,014 pharmacists registered to practise in Australia.

This year 244 new complaints were received about 220 NSW pharmacists representing 2.45% of NSW registered pharmacists. This is 27% more than the 192 complaints received last year about NSW registered pharmacists in 2013/14.

Complaints about NSW pharmacists included:

- 92 related to conduct 38%
- 140 related to performance 57%
- 12 related to health/impairment 5%.

12 mandatory notifications were received about 11 practitioners, that is 4.9% of total complaints about NSW pharmacists.

Complaints were received from:

- 91 patients 37.3%
- 35 relatives of patients or practitioner 14.3%
- 29 health professionals 11.9%
- 25 member of the public 10.2%
- 41 other agency 16.8%
- 12 pharmaceutical services 4.9%
- 3 employers 1.2%
- 2 self report 0.8%
- 6 other sources, including employee and anonymous source 2.6%.

Complaints management included the completion of:

- 2 Tribunals
- 1 Performance Review Panel
- 5 Performance assessments
- 9 Practitioner health assessments
- 14 Impaired Registrant Panels
- 12 Council Inquiries.

58 practitioners were monitored for compliance with orders/conditions in the reporting period.

213 complaints were closed during the year with outcomes including:

- 1 Registration cancellation or disqualification
- 1 Registration surrendered
- 16 conditions imposed
- 2 orders with no conditions
- 5 reprimands
- 3 cautions issued
- 15 counselling
- 1 referred to another body
- 123 no further action required
- 48 discontinued
- 5 withdrawn.

Council Membership

Register of Pharmacies

Clause 14 of Schedule 5F of the Law requires the Council to keep a Register of Pharmacies. Changes to the Register of Pharmacies occurs upon the approval of applications to the Council, satisfactory inspection of premises where required and payment of the relevant fee.

Offences under Schedule 5F of the Law

Schedule 5F of the Law sets out provisions related to the holding of pecuniary interests in pharmacy businesses and the responsibilities of pharmacy owners which, if contravened, may give rise to a Council initiated Local Court prosecution.

No Local Court prosecutions were conducted in the reporting period.

Pharmacy Inspectors

Pharmacy inspectors have the State-wide function of conducting inspections and investigations to enforce compliance with the Law and the Regulations. This includes inspection of existing, new and relocating pharmacies and investigation of complaints against pharmacists.

The position also has responsibilities under the *Poisons and Therapeutic Goods Act 1966* regarding safe handling of medications.

Pharmacy inspectors are appointed as authorised persons under section 164 of the Law, with powers under section 164A to enter and inspect premises, to copy and/or seize records and to require persons to answer questions.

Pharmacy inspectors undertake the following:

- Routine inspections pharmacies across NSW are routinely inspected every 18 months to ensure compliance with the requirements of the Law and Regulations.
- Application approval inspections the approval by the Council of an application concerning
 the relocation of an existing pharmacy or the establishment of a new pharmacy business is
 subject to a satisfactory inspection to ensure compliance with the legislative requirements
 prior to commencing business on a new site.
- Complaints inspections the Council's Notifications Committee may request an inspection be conducted as part of its process of making inquiries into a complaint. During the reporting period inspections were conducted following receipt of the following types of complaints:
 - o operating a pharmacy without a pharmacist in charge
 - o dispensing error
 - o physical condition of the pharmacy and storage of stock
 - o inadequate record keeping
 - o smoking/drinking alcohol on the premises.
- Drug destructions pharmacy inspectors are authorised by the NSW Ministry of Health
 Pharmaceutical Services to destroy and dispose of unusable Schedule 8 medication.

The Council reviewed the fees during the reporting period and determined that a CPI increase of 1.7% would apply from 1 July 2015.

New Pharmacy and Change of Pharmacy Ownership applications received by Council may include proposals for business structures involving trusts. The Council refers trust agreements for external legal review, the cost of which is met by the applicant. There were 19 trust agreements referred for external legal review at an average cost to the applicant of \$1,900.
